Our new Community Benefit Society 'Braemar Community Hydro' launched its main share offer in May to fund construction on the Corriemulzie Burn, just west of the village. Braemar Community Hydro would like every member of the community to join the Society and be a part of owning the Hydro, if they possibly can. The minimum investment is £100.

The money invested by Members will fund a significant green energy business with a 40-year revenue stream into a community fund. The fund contribution is estimated to be around £7,000 a year in the early years, enough to make a big difference to

local organisations. It can also be used to attract matching funds from external bodies.

All regulatory permissions are in place, the Society has a firm agreement to tie-in to the National Grid, and a fixed price design and build construction contact has been placed. Final design is underway and the immediate target is to raise £300,000 by end June so that construction can commence. This is the only remaining hurdle.

An earlier share offer in March for £150,000 was fully subscribed, with 45 Members joining the Society in just 10 days. The current offer is well on the way to reaching its June target but more subscribers are still required.



Louise Kelly - 'Bore da' *

The lovely Louise, Cub Scout Assistant and recently appointed Cub Leader; Director of BCL; active member of the local Amateur Dramatics Club; avid reader and member of a local Book Group; newly appointed committee member of the Braemar SWRI and on the committee of the Braemar Creative Arts Festival, in charge of evening events. So how did Louise become such an active member of Braemar community?

Born in St Asaph, on the North Wales Coast, at the time the smallest city in the UK, her father Viv, a sales director for Mercedes Benz, was from a welsh speaking family and her mother Carol, was from the Wirral. Louise has a younger brother, Jay. She grew up in Llanelian, another small village with one pub and one church. Her mother still lives in the same house in Llanelian. Louise professes to having a fairly idyllic childhood. Playing on the beaches, walking in Snowdonia, spending her weekends in Betws-y-Coed, where her father grew up, poddling in the river and generally 'being kids'. She started school at the tender age of 4yrs old, the day after her 4th birthday. Ysgol Y Plas, was a very rural welsh speaking church school. The school, a converted tithe barn, consisted of a big class and a little class and all lessons,



with the exception of English, were taught in Welsh. It was a shock to her young system when she moved to Ysgol Bryn Elian, a secondary school of 800 pupils and English speaking.

From a very young age Louise was besotted/obsessed with animals, taking any injured animal home with her and then being distraught when it had died by the morning. She had originally thought a career as a vet was for her but as her father pointed out she would have to eventually put animals to sleep. She always knew she would go to university and chose Stirling because of the course, Animal Behaviour. Whilst at Stirling Louise worked during term time as a researcher at Edinburgh Zoo with the chimpanzees, and during the holidays as a zoo keeper in the Welsh Mountain Zoo in Colwyn Bay, looking after the chimps and reptiles. She graduated in September 1992 with a BSc Hons, specialising in Behavioural Primatology. After graduation she got a place to do a PhD in Atlanta Georgia at Emery University but unfortunately could not raise enough funding to cover the fees. Dreams shattered.

Her brother, Jay, was working as a Junior Manager at the Invercauld Arms Hotel and in 1993 Louise moved up to Braemar and started work at the Invercauld in the bar. Jay left, Louise did not. She has had a few different jobs in Braemar over the years but in 1999 she was offered the job as Manager of the Lochacarron shops in Braemar and she still continues there today. She has also worked at Braemar Lodge part time for the last 18 years. Louise loves to travel, continuing a theme from her childhood, and has been to India many times over the years. She also visits her Mum in France every year. Her Father had a lovely saying, 'Money is better spent creating memories than buying possessions' and Louise likes to live by this philosophy. She has remained in Braemar as her friends are now her family and she loves the sense of community.

Juniper Disease Katy Fenemar

As a gin and tonic loving runner, it's hard to beat running through our juniper scented Morrone Birkwood. The Birkwood is the UK's most extensive example of the transition between woodland and juniper in the UK, and its flora remain unchanged since the end of the last ice age.

However, this stunning habitat is under threat, since the discovery of juniper disease. The disease, discovered first in the UK in 2007, is a fungus like pathogen that attacks the plants roots. The first signs are rust coloured foliage, which leads to dieback, and eventual death. Spores are most likely to be spread in soil and water, with a higher risk on wet soils.

Keeping to the path and cleaning your boots when you leave the birkwood will help inhibit the spread.

Book Corner by Erin MacAlpine

I recently joined the Braemar Book Club, and have read a number of interesting books over the

last few months. If you are into Historical novels that seem to have a new twist with every turn of the page, then *The Miniaturist*, a debut novel from Jessie Burton, is a must read. Set in 17th Century Amsterdam, provincial eighteen year old Nella Oortman, the new bride of a wealthy and charismatic merchant - a man she barely knows is met with a less than warm welcome from her new sister in law. It is not the best of starts, and it gets progressively stranger as Nella's husband presents her with an exquisite miniature replica of their own sheltered, controlled home. As the novel progresses, what initially seemed to be an innocuous wedding present soon turns sour as it allows Nella to uncover the unusual secrets of those she lives with, allowing her to understand and fear - the escalating dangers that await them all.

If you are interested in page turning thrillers, then I recommend I Am Pilgrim, a debut novel from Terry Hayes. I Am Pilgrim tells the gripping tale of a former intelligence agent who wrote a book on forensic pathology who becomes involved in a case where someone uses his book to commit untraceable murders. To read this book is to go on an adventure, and by the time you reach the last page, you won't know if you are more exhilarated or exhausted!

The castle has had a roaring start to the season, with 1680 visitors to the castle in April and May. Braemar Dinner Theatre Group played their Murder Mystery nights to sell-out crowds. Maureen Kelly has been researching a talk of the lives of the castle's servants, and we can find out what she has learned in the Drawing Room on Sunday 28th June. We also celebrated our first wedding of the season in the castle. Many congratulations to Mr and Mrs Steve and Heather Rennie.

Jacobite Dinner (Saturday 4th July) looks likely to sell out well in advance and preparations for Jacobite Day (Sunday 26th July) continue apace. Contact info@braemarcastle.co.uk for tickets. Two of our German students will be joining us this year, Mandy Focken and Charleen Blaa, with Britta and Laura also hoping to make an appearance. We'll also be taking on two Scottish students, with interviews being held at the beginning of June.

Work on the Castle Conservation Plan continues, with a heating and electrics survey carried out at the end of May, a measured survey and condition report, an inventory of contents




and a full social and economic history of the building. Implementation of the Landscape Plan has begun, the snowberry at the visitor entrance (aka Sleeping Beauty's thicket) has been cleared and, most obviously, the larches at the rear of the castle have been removed. The larches were coming towards the end of their life, so there was a concern that if they blew down the curtain wall would be damaged. Opening up the views of the castle has had a dramatic effect, the castle can now be seen from the Quoich and the other side of the glen. Internally, the light in the rooms is much improved and we hope that the dampness in the curtain wall will dry out.

Music at St Margaret's Brian Wood

The recent Evensong Service led by the choir of the Royal School of Church Music in Glasgow demonstrated clearly the fine acoustic qualities of the St Margaret's and what an ideal venue it provides for choral performances. We look forward to further choral events with the return of Paul Mealor and the Aberdeen University Singers and the inaugural Schools' Choral festival planned for September.

In the meantime pupils at Braemar, Strathdon and Tarland schools are rehearsing hard for their concert as part of the Aberdeen University Sound Festival and will perform in the building at 4.00pm on Monday 22 June.



This is a big year for the village with the 300th anniversary of the 1715 Jacobite Rising and to help mark the occasion there will be a concert featuring well-known Scottish singer Sheena Wellington and other artists on Friday 24 July. Tickets will be on sale soon.

In July we will once again welcome to St Margaret's one of the groups featuring in the Aberdeen International Youth Festival. The Kiryat Ono Youth Concert Band will be in the village with forty talented young musicians from Israel on Friday 31 July.

With money raised by the Scottish Redundant Churches Trust (SRCT) we expect some roof and floor repairs to be carried out in St Margaret's over the summer. This will hopefully result in the removal of the steel propping in the Lightfoot Aisle and the building being re-opened to the public during the week.


